order	to ask for something you want to buy	I'd like to order a coffee
menu	list of food and drinks available	Can I see the menu?
size	how big or small something is	What size would you like?
small	not big	I'll have a small coffee
medium	middle size	A medium latte, please
large	big	I want a large cappuccino
latte	coffee with steamed milk	I love vanilla latte
cappuccino	coffee with milk foam on top	One cappuccino, please
sugar	sweet white powder for drinks	Do you want sugar?
milk	white liquid from cows	Coffee with milk
hot	very warm	I want hot coffee
cold	not warm	Iced coffee is cold
receipt	paper showing what you paid	Here's your receipt
total	final amount to pay	The total is five dollars
change	money you get back	Here's your change

## ■ Key Phrases

I'd like a coffee → I'd like a coffee | **What size?** → What size? | **How much is that?** → How much is that? | **Here you go** → Here you go | **No sugar, thanks** → No sugar, thanks | **Have a nice day** → Have a nice day

## ■ Grammar Rules

1. Use 'I'd like' for polite requests: 'I'd like' is more polite than 'I want'. Use it when ordering food or drinks.
2. Put size before the noun: Size adjectives come before the thing you're describing. This is the correct word order in English.
3. Use 'please' and 'thank you': Always use polite words like 'please' and 'thank you'. It shows respect and good manners.
4. Ask questions with 'Can I' or 'Could I': These phrases are polite ways to ask for something. They're better than direct commands.
5. Use 'How much' for prices: 'How much' is the correct way to ask about prices. You can add 'is that' at the end.
6. Use 'Here you go' when giving: 'Here you go' is a friendly way to give something to someone. It's very common in shops.
