Grammar Rules

1. Present Simple for Emotions: Use present simple tense when describing how things make you feel. Add '-s' for third person singular.
2. Adjective + Noun Order: Place adjectives directly before the nouns they describe. This creates more vivid descriptions.
3. Future with Will: Use 'will' plus base verb to express future actions or make predictions about outcomes.
4. Articles with Abstract Nouns: Abstract concepts like hope, love, darkness often don't need articles when used generally.
5. Modal Verbs for Recommendations: Use 'should' or 'must' to give advice about movies and stories to watch.
6. Expressing Strong Feelings: Use intensifying words like 'really,' 'so,' 'very' to show strong emotions about stories.
