■ Key Phrases

■ Grammar Rules

1. Present Perfect Formation: Form with have/has + past participle. Shows connection between past and present.
2. Article Usage Rules: Use 'a/an' for general, 'the' for specific. No article for general plurals.
3. Preposition Time Rules: At + specific times, On + days/dates, In + months/years/periods. Fixed combinations.
4. First Conditional Structure: If + present simple, will + infinitive. For real future possibilities.
5. Modal Verb Usage: Can (ability), should (advice), must (obligation). Follow with base infinitive without 'to'.
6. Comparative and Superlative: Add -er/-est for short adjectives, more/most for long ones. Than with comparatives.
