rate	Price per night	What's the nightly rate?
vacancy	Available room	Do you have any vacancy?
confirm	To verify or make certain	Please confirm my booking
suite	Large luxury hotel room	The suite has a living room
deposit	Money paid in advance	We require a deposit
cancellation	Ending a booking	What's your cancellation policy?
receipt	Proof of payment	May I have a receipt?
upgrade	To get a better room	Can you upgrade my room?

### ■ Grammar Rules

1. Polite requests with modals: Use 'could', 'would', or 'may' for polite hotel requests. This shows respect and professionalism in hospitality contexts.
2. Prepositions with time: Use 'on' for specific dates, 'for' for duration, and 'at' for specific times. Correct preposition use is essential for clear communication.
3. Present perfect for experience: Use present perfect to describe hotel experiences without specific times. It's common when discussing preferences or general experiences.
4. Question formation for information: Use WH-questions to get specific hotel information. Start with what, when, where, how much for different types of details.
5. Articles with hotel amenities: Use 'a/an' for single amenities and 'the' for specific hotel features. Articles help specify what you're referring to clearly.
6. Future with 'will' for promises: Hotel staff use 'will' to make promises about service. Guests can also use 'will' for future arrangements and commitments.
