■ Grammar Rules

1. Present Simple in Stories: Use present simple to make stories feel immediate. Subject + base verb for most persons.
2. Adjective + Noun Order: Adjectives always come before nouns in English. This creates descriptive phrases.
3. Past Simple Formation: Add -ed to regular verbs for past tense. Irregular verbs change completely.
4. Modal Verbs Usage: Can/could/might show possibility. Use base verb after modals, no 's' or 'ing'.
5. Encouraging Expressions: Use specific phrases to encourage others. Learn these as complete expressions.
6. Story Sequence Words: Use time words to connect story events. First, then, next, finally show order.
